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#### **ADVENT REFLECTION**

#### A Time to Reflect on Catholic Spiritual Books

During Advent, some of us may read or watch The Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens. Many of us will view the movie It's A Wonderful Life. Advent can also be a time to reflect on the Catholic Spiritual Classic books such as Introduction to a Devout Life by Saint Francis de Sales, The Spiritual Exercises by Saint Ignatius of Loyola and The Dark Night of the Soul by Saint John of the Cross.

Here are a few excerpts from each of these: First, in Introduction to a Devout Life, Saint Francis de Sales states "Prayer made in union with this divine sacrifice (Mass) has inestimable power (Philothea- lover of God)." Second, in the Spiritual Exercises, Saint Ignatius recommends that "after the noon meal he should ask God our Lord for what he desires, namely, the grace to remember how many times he has fallen into the sin or, defect, and to correct himself in the future." Third, in the Dark Night of the Soul, Saint John mentions "the imperfection of pride," that one has "a degree of satisfaction with the works and themselves" in spiritual exercises. This saint compares this individual with the Pharisee in Luke 18:11-12 who practiced religious exercises, but condemned the sinful, tax collector. The common thread here is these saints' fulfillment of the first commandment of loving God with our whole being (Mark 12:30).

It is my prayer this Advent we not only contemplate these classics' spiritual principles, but also demonstrate their wisdom in our daily lives.
