THE 1ST LUMINOUS MYSTERY

The Baptism of Jesus

Passages to reflect on: Matthew 3:13-17, Mark 1:9-11, and Luke 3:21-22

The passages that describe the Baptism of Jesus are special because they contain all 3 persons of the Trinity in one place: Jesus is present in physical form, God's voice comes down from the heavens, and the Holy Spirit descends as a dove.

"After Jesus was baptized, he came up from the water and behold, the heavens were opened for him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming upon him. And a voice came from the heavens, saying, 'This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased'" (Mt 3:16-17 NAB).

When Jesus went to the River Jordan to be baptized by John the Baptist, John was confused why Jesus would want to be baptized by him since he was not "worthy to carry his sandals" (Mt 3:11). While we get baptized to cleanse us of sin, Jesus was sinless and did not need to be purified. He chose to be baptized to provide us with an example of how we should live. The Baptism of Jesus is a luminous mystery because Jesus is lighting a way for us and providing us with clarity so that we can follow in his footsteps.

Jesus, light my path and help me to live as You lived.

LENTEN REFLECTION

Avoidance of the Spiritual River of No Return

On July 5, 2024, I watched a television series **Aerial America** on the National Geographic channel. This broadcast features the history and places of each state of the United States. I was especially interested in the Salmon River in Idaho, the River of No Return. Part of our Lenten journey should be about the avoidance of the spiritual river of no return; three areas we regret: anger, gossip, and unforgiveness.

First, losing our temper can be forgiven, but not be undone, once we have lost control (See Ephesians 4:26). Second, gossip, speaking something about another person whether true or untrue that hurts them cannot be taken back (See Proverbs 18:21). Third, sometimes, unforgiveness (not choosing reconciliation) is a non-second-chance action if the person offended has either died or is unaccepting of it (See Matthew 6:15-16).

Lent is also about returning to our Lord Jesus. We can replace the 3 above-referenced sins with these 4 faith-filled actions: Attendance of Mass, going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation, personal prayer to our Lord, and service to others. Our avoidance of sin and faithfulness to God will produce Christ's power, forgiveness, peace, and joy in our daily lives.

St. Casimir
